Your National Voice

The ACLT has travelled across the country, engaging with land trusts at regional conferences in Quebec, Ontario, and British Columbia. Through these encounters, we've listened intently to ensure we can amplify their concerns and aspirations. As the national voice for land trusts, we've proudly been representing our community within the Green Budget Coalition to promote your important work to GBC partners and federal decision-makers as an essential component to achieving the Global Biodiversity Framework goals.



Indigenous Relations Working Group

Established in January 2023 to develop recommendations on how we can operate and govern while meaningfully engaging with Indigenous peoples, apply an Indigenous lens on programs and leadership, and provide support to the land trust community at large in reconciliation. The group's complete and ongoing projects include ACLT's statement on Indigenous conservation and engagement; relationship-building with Indigenous communities and Indigenous-led land trusts; and the development of resources, guides, and training to support Indigenous-led conservation initiatives and established land trusts in fostering meaningful relationships.

Land Trust Conservation Fund Working Group

ACLT has been working in collaboration with WHC, providing recommendations on the administration of the LTCF and offering presentations to WHC staff so that they may better understand your work, the complex nature of land holding, and the need for stable funding. We have also been advocating for a future for the LTCF beyond 2026



ACLT's Ongoing Projects

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Canadian Land Trusts Standards and Practices Online Tool

In collaboration with LTABC, OLTA, and RMN we have developed an online selfassessment tool to track your progress in accordance with the 2019 Canadian Land Trust Standards and Practices. Participating organizations will be encouraged to share their results and resources on this platform to foster an exchange of expertise and open a discussion on governance and operational best practices within our national network. 2 Municipal Protected Areas Project

With our partners at Nature Canada, LTABC, and RMN, Wildlands League, Nature BC, and Nature Ontario we have conducted a survey of land trusts, laying the groundwork for informed advocacy efforts. We have also published a guide outlining Conservation Options for Municipalities. Currently, we are delving deeper into research on tax incentives across provinces and examples of meaningful Indigenous relations with municipalities.

GIS Capacity-Building

The ACLT is enhancing its GIS capacity to collect national-level data, focusing on vital conservation information. We are researching opportunities and barriers for land trusts to report protected areas to CPCAD, aiming for streamlined data integration. Recognizing the pivotal role of data in advocacy, we are committed to promoting land trusts' conservation work nationally.

4 Salesforce

ACLT has begun the process of implementing Salesforce as its CRM software. In tandem with organizing practices, this platform will be utilized to track critical data, engage people at a large scale, and facilitate collaboration, communication, and relationship-building across Canada.

Land Trust Starter Guide

This guide was developed by ACLT to gather critical information and resources to provide guidance for those considering starting a land trust in Canada.

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Policy Development

In our strategic efforts to ensure ACLT's organizational health, we have begun developing critical operational policies such as our Governance policy, Financial Internal Controls policy, Conflict of Interest Policy, and Whistleblower Policy.



ACLT National Survey of Land Trusts

In the fall of 2023, we conducted a national census survey of land trusts with the purpose of collecting baseline data about their properties and stewardship activities, memberships and volunteers, governance structures and human resources, funding and preferences for programs and tools. We invited 118 land trusts to complete a 44-question online bilingual survey, and nearly 73% replied. With this invaluable data in hand, we are better equipped and are actively working to support and accurately represent the Canadian land trust community to funders, governments and the general public.

In 2023, our land trust members helped conserve at least 218,000 ha and 3,800 properties
